



Reflections in the Water: Summer Reading with Coffee and Conversation

"By referring to this, when you read you can understand my insight into the mystery of Christ." -Ephesians 3:4



In June we kicked off a summer reading series with coffee and conversation about Barbara Brown Taylor's book Holy Envy at a local coffee shop. I'd like to share with you below a couple of highlights from our meeting:

"The only clear line I draw these days is this: when my religion tries to come between me and my neighbor, I will choose my neighbor...Jesus never commanded me to love my religion."

Taylor shares that the title of her book comes from biblical scholar Krister Stendahl, who proposed three principles for engaging people of other faiths:

- When trying to understand another religion, you should ask the adherents of that religion and not its enemies.
- Don't compare your best to their worst.
- Leave room for holy envy.

I enjoyed the fellowship, tangents, as well as laughter from this first gathering 'where two or more are gathered.' Our conversations continue with the following books in July.

Sunday July 7, 4:00 p.m., FPC, Smithfield

From Red Earth—A Rwandan Story of Healing and Forgiveness by Denise Uwimana A survivor and widow of the 1994 genocide, Denise Uwimana shares her story of rebuilding a life among the people who murdered her family. Christian acts of grace, forgiveness, and sharing painful truths are the themes for our discussion.

Tuesday July 16, 4:00 p.m., Simple Twist, Smithfield The Cloud of Unknowing — William Johnston, Editor

This easy to read collection offers short often pithy reflections and insights from a 14th Century English monastic leader with 21st Century life applications for individuals and faith communities.

In August we will conclude the reading series with Rachel Held Evans' Faith Unraveled and Mitchell Zuckoff's Fall and Rise. All are welcome to join this casual fellowship for conversation; it is not necessary to have read the books (although that will help!). My hope is to engage in open conversation and questions regarding the faith questions raised by the readings. And if you cannot make the meetings, I encourage you to read the books on your own as I will be weaving in their themes in weekly bible study as well as sermons over the course of the summer.


We can't believe this is our fourth year to offer a summer music camp. Kathy Rice, Jennifer
