Reflections in the Water: Conversation and Coffee: A Summer Reading List

The Memorial Day weekend is now upon us as I write signaling the start of the summer season. Our energies are shifting from indoor work to outdoor plans for gardens, travel to beaches, mountains, and family occasions, as well as a respite from school and perhaps just catching up on to do lists. Every year I develop a summer reading list a habit from my school days. Kindle type devices, audiobooks, as well as a hardcover books provide opportunities to share the ideas of others, challenge our thinking and be transported to new realms from the comfort of our personal space.

Several years ago Oprah Winfrey began her monthly book club to encourage reading as well as community connections among people. In the same vein I've attempted here to select several books relevant to spiritual growth as well as reflecting on real world issues written by gifted authors. *Our first coffee and conversation will be at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 18, 2019, at Starbucks in Smithfield with the book **Holy Envy** by Barbara Brown Taylor. I've had the good fortune to attend several speaking engagements with Dr. Taylor. She is regarded by many mainline Protestant churches as one of the leading preachers and writers on 21st Century American Christianity, and she shares her most recent work to speak of living as a Christian in a multi-faith environment and what we share and can learn from others in this context while remaining true to our own confession. The book is written with humor, humility, and sensitivity to the presence of God moving within our lives through the presence of others.*

I hope to continue these gatherings over the summer as relaxing opportunities to share with other venues and times to be announced, discuss and think together without a formal structure, enjoy one another's company, and perhaps share a good book among friends.

Yes We Can!

The contributed food items keep coming in for Yes We Can. FPC donated 55 items in May.

In a recent conversation with John Parrish, Chairman of the Smithfield Ministries Food Closet, I learned the following information about the Food Closet:



- Twenty-three organizations participate in the Food Closet. Twelve of those are churches.
- Three counties involved are Harnett, Lee and Johnston. Mr. Parrish said that maybe 10 requests from Lee and Harnett counties are made each month, but the majority of request by far are from Johnston County.
- Twenty-two volunteers assist the food closet each month. The suggested amount of time to volunteer is two-and-a-half hours per week. Some volunteer an hour a week and others, five hours a week. Mr. Parrish says volunteers are always welcome and can contact him at 919-280-6180 to arrange a time for training and developing a work schedule.
- Annually, a \$2,000 grant from the national Presbyterian Church (USA) is awarded to the Johnston County Food Bank.
- Monthly, 1800 people representing about 600 families receive groceries from the Food Closet.
- First Presbyterian is a major contributor to the local food bank that provides so much for so many people in need.

Our Missionaries in Niger, the McGills

Our missionaries, the McGills, recently had some of their major plans for the residents of Niamey, Niger changed. Jim had some major health problems, was flown to Paris for two surgeries, had some time to recuperate, and then was flown to Decatur, Georgia for healing at the Mission Haven/Headquarters. Last report was that Jim was to return to Niger at the end of April.



Jody, Jim's wife, stayed in Niger while Jim was recovering. She recently wrote a lengthy report on what is taking place in their mission area. Last October, Jim assisted in the completion of a structure (made from old train box cars) that houses a place for training and manufacturing various rope pumps, sanitation, slabs, water recharge, retention of water to reuse, and sanitation (latrines). All of these projects lead to "Water, Sanitation and Hygiene" (WaSH) programs, partially sponsored by the Presbyterian Church (USA). Jody continues to get the new nursing school (approved by the Niger government) ready for training and to give advice to citizens. This is done with cooperation from surrounding colleges and agencies. These efforts are raising the living and health standard for the people of Niger.

Please keep the McGills, their staff, their patients, and all their efforts in your prayers for the improvement of the Nigerian population.

Habitat for Humanity

One in four persons in Johnston and Wake Counties lack access to affordable housing. (The U.S. government regards housing costs at or below 30% of one's income to be affordable.) Habitat for Humanity is trying to address affordable housing in two ways. First, generate as many affordable housing units as possible. (The goal is to increase house production in Johnston County from one house to five houses per year.) Second, Habitat for Humanity calls attention to the issue so that a number of forces can address the whole situation.

The direct cost of a house usually is close to the appraised value. The home buyer purchases a house with sweat equity and a mortgage. The mortgage is for the appraised value of the house. Volunteer labor and financial donations to Habitat for Humanity make it possible for mortgage payments to be subsidized so that the payment is at or below 30% of the buyer's income. Financial donations and Restore donations also cover the cost of non-construction staff overhead.

This year, Habitat for Humanity is constructing 2 houses in Selma as part of the ramp up to 5 houses per year in Johnston County. One house is almost complete and a second house will begin construction June 1 with a wall raising on June 1 at 208 N. Sharpe Street in Selma. FPC is signed up to work on June 1.

Volunteers are needed for June 1 as well as on following Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays until the house is complete which is anticipated for August. If you would like to volunteer, register at <https://habitatwake.volunteerhub.com/lp/johnstoncountycoalition>. If you registered last year, you may have to confirm the information they have on hand. Hubert Conn Schmidt, Jr. is a blessing to First Presbyterian Church, Smithfield. We have come to rely on him for so many things during his seven years here. He and his wife came to us from Texas. A graduate of Weatherford College, Hubert had an impressive career as an educator, teaching first, second, seventh and eighth grades. He was a reading specialist as well as the diagnostician for and the coordinator of special education programs. He briefly served as a principal, but preferred the classroom. He and Judy have one daughter, Holly; a son-in-law, Kyle; and two grandsons, Harper and Asher.

Hubert currently serves as the chair of the Mission Outreach Quadrant. He has served as its secretary for two years and the Membership Chair for four years. Hubert is a very creative thinker. He and his committee have canvassed neighborhoods, leaving information about our church by their mailboxes. He has created bulletin boards that spotlight individual members of our church. Hubert is also a supporter of refugees and has volunteered with World Relief Durham.

An accomplished artist, Hubert's work has been displayed at the Clayton Center and the Clayton Steak House. He creates a new poster for our church each month to publicize our Yes We Can food drive for Smithfield Area Ministries' local food closet. Hubert also designs a Christmas card of our church each year for our PYC's Silent Auction. He created a bulletin board to keep our church informed of our work with Habitat for Humanity. He also helps to raise money for Habitat and volunteers for the Smithfield Rescue Mission. Hubert is a supporter of our program to provide meals for the local SECU Hospice House, regularly providing dishes for this outreach.

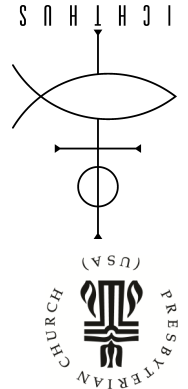

It became one of the loveliest and most spiritual rooms in our church.

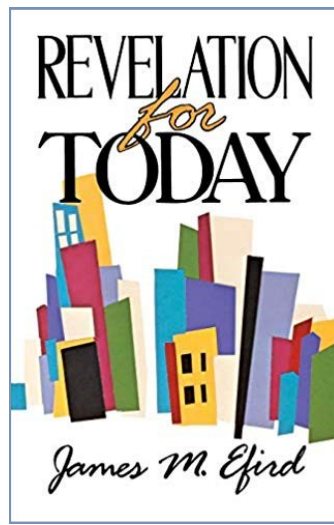
Good Vibrations
